For the sixth time in Grant history, the Varsity Dance Team qualified for the IHSA Dance State Finals! It has been a historic season for the team as they came out hot, placing first at their first competition hosted by Lake Zurich. They went up against 25 teams in their second invitational at Stagg High School and took Second Place. They continued to churn out victories in the new year with a First Place finish at the D117 All of the Lights competition and Huntley Invite (both happening within the same weekend). Moving into another successful weekend, the team competed against the entire NLCC and came out as the 2023 Dance NLCC Champs! This momentum stayed with them as they snagged a hard-earned Second Place at an intense competition at Grayslake Central, competing against last year's State Champs. The tough competition did not stop there. The team went into an immensely talented Sectional and put their best headsprings forward for a performance you wouldn't forget. Their fire and energy earned them a First Place finish at Sectionals and the title of Sectional Champions! This is the first year in the program's history that a team has placed first at Sectionals, making their already exceptional season even better. Maddy Riske, a four-year team member and current Captain, expressed that "Sectionals was fun! Obviously, State wasn't promised; it's not promised for anyone. But in years past, we were more worried about just making it [to State]. Whereas this year, our goal was making it to State, but we had focused on possibly the title of Sectionals Champs because we were so close last year." This team has been growing together all season and has proved to the entire community that when you all come together, anything is possible.

On day one of Dance State, the team ventured out to Grossinger Motors Arena before the first performance to support their teammate, Beverly Segoviano, as she sang the national anthem alongside the Jacksonville J'ettes. After Beverly's opening act, the team prepared for their performance. With their family-like bond, passion for dance, and coordination, it's no surprise the team placed high enough to compete on day two. They put on another show-stopping performance, even raising their scores from the day prior, and placed eighth in the state! While Riske has performed at State in the past, she shared that "it was a different experience because we go to perform on day two this year. It was really exciting, but also very nerve-racking." We've known that this team was part of the best of the best, but now they've proven it to all of Illinois. Although this marked the end of their season, there is much more to come from the program and we can't wait to see them perform again in the fall.

His audition score was so high, that he will now represent Grant at the ILMEA All-State Music Festival. He traveled to Peoria, IL, on January 25 to participate in several rehearsals leading up to the All-State Concert on January 28. He sang under the direction of Dr. Eric Johnson from Northern Illinois University, and sang alongside hundreds of the best singers from across the state. Andre is the first Grant student IN HISTORY to qualify for state two years in a row! He did a great job representing Grant and we are so proud of him for this achievement!

5Essentials Survey

This opportunity allows stakeholders to share their thoughts on the important elements of school effectiveness in a survey about Grant Community High School. Seal of Biliteracy

The next administration of language proficiency testing for the State Seal of Biliteracy is on February 15, 2023! The Seal of Biliteracy is a recognition for students who demonstrate proficiency in English and one or more other languages. When earned, the Seal of Biliteracy will appear on the student's official transcript and diploma. Students who earn the Seal of Biliteracy are also provided with the opportunity to earn early college credit. All public colleges and universities in the State of Illinois have criteria for how this credit is awarded. Students should reference the college or university website for their criteria about how the specific institution recognizes the Seal of Biliteracy for college credit.

To qualify for the State Seal of Biliteracy, a Grant student must accomplish one of the following to demonstrate proficiency in English:

- Earn a minimum score of 480 on the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing portion of an official administration of the SAT
- Earn a minimum score of 4.8 on the ACCESS test
- Earn a score of 5 on the AP English and Language Composition Test
- Earn a score of I-5 on the AAPPL English Test

To demonstrate proficiency in another language, each student must also meet one of the following criteria:

- Earn a score of 4 or higher on the AP Spanish Test
- Earn a minimum score of I-5 on the AAPPL test in the chosen language

Students wishing to earn the Seal of Biliteracy are encouraged to discuss the opportunity with their counselor. The fee for taking the AAPPL test is \$20 and can be paid by this link, <u>AAPPL Test Fee</u>. To register for the test, please also complete the following document by February 9, 2023: <u>Seal of Biliteracy Language Proficiency Exam Registration</u>.

AP Exams

The 2023 AP Exams will be administered in schools during the first two weeks in May: May 1-5 & May 8-12.

All remaining fee balances must be paid by February 24, 2023.

Students with a new second semester AP course (US Government or Macroeconomics) need to communicate with their instructors if they DO NOT wish to take the spring AP Exams by Friday, February 17. Once a student indicates that he or she is taking the test, parents should go to our RevTrak system to pay for the exam(s) if it was not included in the fall registration process.

If your student receives free or reduced lunch and is paying the reduced exam fee, please contact Ms. Fischer in our Curriculum Office or via phone at 847-973-3800. We will certainly work with individual students and families to make sure every qualified student is able to take Advanced Placement exams.


Important Deadlines for AP Exam Registrations:

- Friday, February 17, 2023: Students in a second semester only AP course, need to notify teachers if they DO NOT plan to take the AP exam.
- Friday, February 25, 2023: All exams must have the remaining balance paid or the exam will be canceled and the student will forfeit the \$40.00 Pre-Registration Fee.

Beginning with the 2022/23 school year, a student representative has participated as a non-voting representative to the Board of Education. The goal of the student representative is to give input on matters that affect all students and work together with the Board of Education to promote open communication between the Board and the students of District 124. The student representative serves as an "ex officio member," meaning they are encouraged to participate in discussions, but may not vote on them.

The District 124 Board of Education is a policy-making body responsible for selecting the superintendent and adopting and enforcing all necessary rules for the management and governance of the school district. February is CTE (Career and Technical Education) Month and we are using that to celebrate the opportunities for our students through the CTE department. Over the past six years, our staff has worked hard to expand access and opportunities for our students to explore their career interests and expand their capacity through rigorous new curricula. In that time, our CTE department has launched courses in entrepreneurship, mobile application design, technology support, engineering, and education. The expansion in our curriculum has included dual credit courses, internships, and opportunities for students to earn industry credentials. These changes to our curriculum and our attention to developing career pathways for our students have led to exciting opportunities for our students.

In our entrepreneurship pathway, students have been engaged within the IncubatorEDU curriculum over the past three years. Students in this course have

the opportunity to take an idea for a product and build their business plan through the "lean start-up model". As they

do this, our students have the opportunity to engage with nearly twenty industry professionals and leaders to learn firsthand about how to start and run a business. Our students present their plans at minimum viable product pitches and then again at a final pitch to our Board of Advisors who select the best business plan within the group.

Our future engineers have immersed themselves in our engineering pathway as they have worked through our Project Lead the Way course sequence. Through these courses, students learn critical thinking skills and

the technical skills to prepare for undergraduate study in Engineering. Students engage with industry professionals in this course as they learn about the Engineering career and receive professional feedback about their work. Within these classes, students work to understand and use CAD programs, 3D printing, programming of robotic arms and belt systems, and the milling of material.

Grant's future educators have jumped into their future careers by taking our new dual credit Introduction to Education course. As part of this class, our students are interning for nearly 60 hours at our feeder schools helping teachers in their classrooms. This past Fall, these students participated in Ridgewood High School's

Education Team-Based Challenge and one of our teams won the High School Lesson Planning category. Gaining more experience to build on for their future, one of our students in this class was also named as the Student Representative to the Board of Education. We are excited to announce that we will be expanding on our current curriculum with the addition of another dual-credit education course in the 2024-2025 school year.

In the past four years, students in our Tech Support Internship have earned over 200 industry credentials. These credentials include, but are not limited to, Microsoft Office Specialist Certification and the CompTIA ITF+ certification. Students also certify to fix our Chromebooks and offer all first-tier technical support for Chromebook issues across the school.

These students have proved to be valuable assets to our teachers and students across the building.



Across all of our classes in the CTE department, we work to open doors to opportunities so that our students can be college and career ready. Whether you want to go into carpentry or manufacturing and are exploring our woods classes, fixing small engines in our Technology Exploration classes, learning culinary skills in our Food Preparation and Nutrition courses, or creating the next generation of iPhone app in our Mobile App Design course, we have a pathway for every student.


