



Hall of Fame

Nomination Information

The Hall of Fame has been established to recognize and showcase outstanding graduates and dedicated staff as part of our efforts to promote excellence and achievement for learners in Grant Community High School District 124.

The Hall of Fame was designed to honor exemplary individuals who have achieved distinction, outstanding accomplishment, or significant contribution within their professions, communities, schools, families, or personal lives.

Nominations

Nominations will be accepted for the Hall of Fame, Class of 2023, until April 21, 2023. Visit GCHS Hall of Fame for the nomination forms.

Criteria to be Considered for Alumni

- Graduates of Grant Community High School are eligible for consideration, provided that graduation occurred at least ten years prior to the year in which they are nominated.
- Graduate has made a significant contribution within their profession, community, school, family, or personal life.
- Graduate positively promotes Grant Community High School.

Criteria to be Considered for Staff

- Staff of Grant Community High School are eligible for consideration if they have a minimum of twenty years of service to District 124 and provided they are either retired or have ceased active employment at least three years prior to the year in which they are nominated.
- Staff member has made a significant contribution at Grant Community High School, in their community, family, or personal life.
- Staff member positively promotes Grant Community High School.

Procedures for Nominations

- Nominations may be made by families, friends, alumni, faculty, staff, administration, and community members of District 124.
- In order to be considered, the nomination form should be fully completed and submitted as outlined on the form.
- Nominations will be kept on file and considered for a total of five years following submission. After five years, a candidate may be re-nominated.

Selection of Inductees

- The selection committee is comprised of a member of the Board of Education, administration, staff, alumni of Grant Community High School District 124, and community members.
- Selected inductees will be contacted by July 1, 2023.

Induction

- New members of the Hall of Fame will be inducted at a ceremony during Homecoming Week 2023.
- New members will be asked to participate in a variety of Homecoming activities, including a reception and awards ceremony at a meeting of the Board of Education, an all-school pep assembly, the varsity football game, and the Homecoming parade. While the intent of this program is to honor graduates and Grant staff, it is also to provide positive role models and inspiration for current students.

For more than 30 years, March has been officially designated by the National Association for Music Education (NAfME) for the observance of Music In Our Schools Month® (MIOSM®), the time of year when music education becomes the focus of schools across the nation. AP Exams

The 2023 AP Exams will be administered in schools during the first two weeks in May: May 1-5 & May 8-12.

AP Exams are going to be here before we know it. Here are some important reminders about our upcoming exams:

- All exams are taken in paper/pencil version unless noted as a digital version (see table below).
- All exams must be taken here at school according to the College Board schedule.
- For all exams, the starting times are 7:40 a.m. for a morning exam or 12:00 p.m. for an afternoon exam.
- The end times are approximate. If a testing session starts later than planned due to technical issues, the test session may run slightly behind schedule. For testing that ends after the school day, students should arrange transportation, or plan to take the activity bus.

Enchanted Garden Prom 2023

This year's Prom, Enchanted Garden, is quickly approaching! Prom is Friday, May 5, and the destination is the Grand Geneva in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. In order to attend Prom, students must be a junior or senior currently enrolled at GCHS or an early graduate of the current graduating class. Students wishing to bring a Freshman, Sophomore or out of school guest are allowed. Students bringing an out of school guest will need to complete the Grant Dance Guest Approval Form. Out-of-school guest forms must be completed and turned into the Deans by Tuesday, April 19.

Tickets to the event will be sold at \$75.00 per ticket. Prom tickets will be on sale online or the Bookstore from April 10 through April 19, 2023. Only check and cash payments can be made in the Bookstore. All GCHS Senior and Junior Students must purchase tickets individually. Seniors/Juniors who are bringing a guest are responsible for their guests. When purchasing tickets for you and your guest, please select the appropriate ticket purchase. Students who have been approved to bring an outside guest, will select the Senior/Junior taking an out of school guest ticket. If your guest has not been pre-approved, the student will not be allowed to attend.

Prom is a school function; all school rules and regulations, as stated in the Student/Parent Handbook, apply for all students attending prom. Students who behave improperly will be referred to a GCHS administrator and parents will be notified. All students and guests will be required to ride school-sponsored bus transportation to and from Prom. This bus transportation is included in the price of the ticket and is mandatory. Students are not allowed to utilize private transportation to or from Prom. Students who do so will not be admitted to Prom.

Prom check-in will begin in the Field House at 5:00 PM on Prom night. Students must present their ticket and current ID upon check-in to the Prom. Outside guests must present a valid state-issued photo ID to be admitted to Prom. Students who do not have proper identification will not be allowed to board a bus. Buses will depart beginning at 5:30 PM. All students must be present for the entire school day on Friday, May 5, in order to attend Prom. No absences, tardies, or passes off campus will be excused for students attending Prom.

PROCESS FOR REPORTING OF SEXUAL ASSAULT

On-Campus Reports

If a student reports an instance of a sexual assault that occurred on campus, parents are immediately notified, as well as the police/authorities and our Students Services Team (SST). While our SST members legally cannot discuss specific details about the accusation, they work to support the student involved and address the trauma associated with the accusation. Police take on the role of notifying the advocacy center for the victim to set up an interview to protect the integrity of the investigation. In Illinois, when there is an allegation of child sexual abuse or severe physical abuse, children are referred to a local Child Advocacy Center (CAC). There, an interview is conducted in a child-friendly environment by a trained professional who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not re-traumatize the child. If the alleged sexual assault occurred on campus or at a school-sponsored event, the District would consult and coordinate with local law enforcement. The district's own internal investigation can not interfere with an ongoing criminal investigation. If the authorities can prove misconduct took place on school grounds or at a school-sponsored event, consequences are issued at a school level and in accordance with District 124 policies and procedures. GCHS always has and will continue to adhere to all court orders and any legal rulings affecting the students involved.

Off-Campus Reports

When students report instances of sexual assault occurring off campus, the police/authorities are notified immediately, and an interview is set up with the advocacy center. In Illinois, when there is an allegation of child sexual abuse or severe physical abuse, children are referred to a local Child Advocacy Center (CAC). There, an interview is conducted in a child-friendly environment by a trained professional who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not re-traumatize the child. When reports of sexual violence are made, our SST members are available to support students, connect students with community resources, and provide supports and options for students to consider while the criminal investigation is ongoing, including a modified school day, modified schedule, etc. All students do have equal access to public education, and all individuals are presumed innocent until proven guilty. The District will strictly adhere to court orders and any legal rulings affecting the students involved.

Additional Resources for Students

To help bridge the gap of trust and support for our students, we have a standing partnership with the Zacharias Sexual Abuse Center (ZCenter). ZCenter seeks to provide quality, comprehensive, client-centered services to survivors of sexual assault and abuse. Students needing additional support outside of SST, can reach out to their Red Team members for more information or visit zcenter.org to connect with a Zacharias member. In addition, we are always willing to change schedules, provide tutoring, set up safe routes, allow students to leave class early, etc., and to provide other support to the student while cases are pending.

Do You Need Help Paying Your Rent?

Are you unable to afford your housing costs in Lake County, Illinois because of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic? If so, you can get help paying your rent.

Who is Eligible?

In order to qualify for help:

- You must pay rent in Lake County, Illinois.
- You must have a financial hardship during COVID (job loss, furlough, reduced hours due to school closures, unexpected medical or other expenses).
- you must be at least one month in arrears (behind in your rent).
- you must be at risk of homelessness or housing instability.
- Your household must have a current annual household income below the following amounts:



STREP THROAT: FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS



WHAT IS STREP THROAT?

Strep throat is an infection in the throat and tonsils that can cause throat pain, fever, and swollen glands in the back of the neck. Anyone can get strep throat; however, it's more common in children ages 5-15 years old. People can get strep throat more than once.

HOW DOES STREP THROAT SPREAD?

The bacteria that causes strep throat can spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes. You can get sick if you breathe in those droplets, or touch something that has the droplets on it and then touch your nose or mouth.

A SIMPLE TEST GIVES FAST RESULTS

There are two types of tests for strep throat: a rapid strep test and a throat culture. Untreated strep can lead to serious illnesses like damage to the heart, brain, kidneys, and other organs.



ANTIBIOTICS ARE USED FOR TREATMENT

People with strep throat should stay home from work, school, or daycare until they: are feeling better with no fever AND have been on the right antibiotics for at least 12 -24 hours.



PROTECT YOURSELF

- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water or alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Avoid sharing eating utensils with someone who is sick with a sore throat.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, upper sleeve, or your elbow.
- Clean your environment and high-touch surfaces, especially things touched by a child with strep throat.
- Avoid contact with open wounds or people with weakened immune systems while still infectious.
- Check with your provider if you or other household members who have been exposed may need treatment and testing, especially if your child's symptoms return after treatment.
- Your child may be advised to stay home for a longer period during outbreaks clusters or recurrent cases

PSAT TESTING

Grant Community High School will be administering the **state-required** SAT Suite of Assessments to all Freshmen, Sophomores, and Juniors on Wednesday, April 12, 2023. **This WILL NOT be a flex start day**. The school day will begin at 7:40 AM with students reporting to their assigned testing location. All testing will be completed around 1:00 PM, and normal bus transportation home will be provided at that time. The test that a student will take depends on the student's grade level.

On Thursday, April 6, Freshmen, Sophomore, and Junior students will receive a notice through their TEAM room that indicates the test the student is scheduled to take, the testing room location to report to that morning, and the necessary materials the student needs to bring for testing. Parents should make sure their student has received that information. Below you will find some more specifics about the tests the students may be taking.

Seniors – *Most seniors will not be in attendance on Wednesday, April* **12.** *Only those Seniors who have been notified that they need to take the school-day test to meet*

graduation requirements will attend. We strongly encourage seniors to use these two days for college visits, finishing up college entrance paperwork, job shadowing, or job searches.

Juniors – All Juniors are required to take the state-required SAT with essay exam as a graduation requirement . This is a college-reportable SAT score. The make-up date for Juniors to take the SAT exam will be on Tuesday, April 25.

Sophomores – All Sophomores are required to take the PSAT 10 from the College Board to better prepare them for the SAT exam they will take next year as part of the state-required college and career readiness exam. The make-up date for Sophomores to take the PSAT 10 exam will be in the afternoon of Wednesday, April 26.

Freshmen - All Freshmen are required to take the PSAT 8/9 from the College Board to better prepare them for the SAT exam they will take their junior year as part of the state-required college and career readiness exam. The makeup date for Freshmen to take the PSAT 8/9 exam will be Monday, April 24.

For all three of these exams, students should bring their Grant Student ID, a calculator and two number 2 pencils on the testing day of Wednesday, April 12.

Throughout Lake County, Illinois, and the U.S., there has been a rise in students vaping. When teens vape, they may not think about all the harmful effects and chemicals entering their body. They're more focused on what their friends are doing and sticking with the "status quo." We want to help break that cycle of thinking and empower our students to say "no" to vaping.

E-cigarette devices contain a lot of nicotine, which is very addicting. Nicotine addiction can make it harder for teens to focus and concentrate. These devices contain additional chemicals that can cause cancer and serious lung problems. Unlike regular cigarettes, e-cigarettes don't have a strong smell and can often go unnoticed. Another device we have seen come into schools is THC pens, or dab pens. The use of marijuana in any form is concerning because it affects the adolescent brain differently. According to the CDC, "the teen brain is actively developing and often will not be fully developed until the mid 20s," and using before that time "can have permanent effects" such as poor coordination, damage to learning, memory, and problem solving, and the ability to pay attention. Vaping marijuana is associated with a dangerous lung disease (EVALI), stomach issues, and seizures. Since coming back from winter break, we have shown our students various videos detailing these topics and even got students involved so we could hear their input. We hope that all students can find this information valuable and move forward in a healthy direction.
