## AP Exams

The 2023 AP Exams will be administered in schools over two weeks in May. For paper-pencil exams, students should bring two \#2 pencils. For digital exams, students need to bring their school-issued Chromebook fully charged and a charging cord. Students taking a digital exam should open the Bluebook app and take the practice test prior to their exam date to ensure the app is functioning properly.

## Morning AP Test Students

Students will report immediately to their testing rooms at the beginning of the school day. Please arrive no later than 7:40 AM for instructions and preparing the answer documents. Morning testing begins at 8 AM . Morning AP tests are typically completed by 11:30 AM. Students who miss lunch while testing will be provided a pass to the cafeteria when testing is finished. After testing, students will return to their regular schedules. Please note that Wednesday tests do not follow the GCHS late start schedule. Wednesday morning exams will begin at 7:40, and students are responsible for their own transportation.

## Afternoon AP Test Students

Students will attend a regular schedule for the morning. Students should plan on arriving no later than 11:40 PM for instructions and preparing the answer documents. The exam will begin at 12 PM. Testing will end between 3:10-3:45 depending on the exam. Students should expect to take the 4:05 PM late bus or arrange for a ride home since testing time might vary. The library will be open for students who need to wait for the late bus.

## Two Tests on the Same Day

Students will be provided with a pass to eat lunch in the cafeteria between the 2 testing times, if time allows. If not, they should bring an easy to consume snack to eat between the tests.

Any additional information will be communicated through email, your AP teacher, and morning announcements. Students should check with their individual teachers to make sure they are current with their class work and homework assignments. ## Soda Enters the Major Leagues

From the fields of GCHS to first baseman in Oakland, Ryan Noda has been making his Bulldog family as he achieves his dream of playing in the Major League. During his Junior year, Ryan earned All Conference in the North Suburban Conference and was named All Area by the Daily Herald and Chicago Sun Times. On top of area recognition, Ryan was voted Team MVP. In his Senior year, Ryan achieved all of this and was named an All State player by IHSBCA and the Prep Baseball Report. His Senior season included an RBI of 49 and a high school career of 113.

After graduating from Grant in 2014, Ryan attended the University of Cincinnati and played three seasons as a Bearcat. He finished out his Freshman season with a .230 batting average, seven home runs, and a 32

The summer before his Sophomore year, he played collegiate summer baseball for the Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox of the Cape Cod Baseball League and helped lead the Red Cox to the league championship. Once Ryan finished up his collegiate career, he was selected to the Toronto Blue Jays in the 15th round of the 2017 Major League Baseball draft. Ryan made a name for himself as he continued to grow his own skills and the team as a whole. In his last year with the Blue Jays, Ryan made 117 appearances for the High-A Dunedin Blue Jays, with 13 home runs, 74 RBI, and 14 stolen bases.

In February 2021, Ryan was traded to the Los Angeles Dodgers and then assigned to the Tulsa Drillers. With a season filled with 29 home runs and 78 RBI, it's no surprise that Ryan was selected as a post-season Double-A Central allstar and then promoted to the Triple-A Oklahoma City Dodgers to begin the 2022 season. In December 2022, the Oakland Athletics selected Noda with the second pick of the Rule 5 draft.

Throughout Ryan's time at Grant, he pushed himself and others to work harder. It's no surprise to his teammates and coaches that he has made it this far. Ryan's coach, Dave Behm, shared that "it has been so exciting for the [Grant] baseball program to watch one of their own compete at the Major League level. Ryan has worked so hard to get where he is today and we're so proud to have been able to be a part of his journey. Ryan's success has made all of Grant proud to be a Bulldog!" With so much drive and determination, we know Ryan has much farther to go and we cannot wait to see him achieve even more than he already has.

# Preventing Youth Suicide <br> Tips for Parents 

## If you or someone you know is suicidal, get help immediately via 911, or via (988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline), or the Crisis Text Line (text "HOME" to 741741).

Suicide is the leading cause of death among school age youth. However, suicide is preventable. Youth who are contemplating suicide frequently give warning signs of their distress. Parents, teachers, and friends are in a key position to pick up on these signs and get help. Most important is to never take these warning signs lightly or promise to keep them secret. When all adults and students in the school community are committed to making suicide prevention a priority and are empowered to take the correct actions-we can help youth before they engage in behavior with irreversible consequences.

## Suicide Risk Factors

Although far from perfect predictors, certain characteristics are associated with increased odd of having suicidal thoughts. These include:

- Mental illness including depression, conduct disorders, and substance abuse.
- Family stress/dysfunction.
- Environmental risks, including presence of a firearm in the home.
- Situational crises (e.g., traumatic death of a loved one, physical or sexual abuse, family violence).


## Suicide Warning Signs

Most suicidal youth demonstrate observable behaviors that signal their suicidal thinking. These include:

- Suicidal threats in the form of direct ("I am going to kill myself") and indirect ("I wish I could fall asleep and never wake up again") statements.
- Suicide notes and plans (including online postings).
- Prior suicidal behavior.
- Making final arrangements (e.g., making funeral arrangements, writing a will, giving away prized possessions).
- Preoccupation with death.
- Changes in behavior, appearance, thoughts and/or feelings.


## What to Do

Youth who feel suicidal are not likely to seek help directly; however, parents, school personnel, and peers can recognize the warning signs and take immediate action to keep the youth safe. When a youth gives signs that they may be considering suicide, the following actions should be taken:

- Remain calm.
- Ask the youth directly if he or she is thinking about suicide (e.g., "Are you thinking of suicide?").
- Focus on your concern for their well-being and avoid being accusatory.
- Listen.
- Reassure them that there is help and they will not feel like this forever.
- Do not judge.
- Provide constant supervision. Do not leave the youth alone.
- Remove means for self-harm.
- Get help: No one should ever agree to keep a youth's suicidal thoughts a secret and instead should tell an appropriate caregiving adult, such as a parent, teacher, counselor, social worker, or school psychologist. Parents should seek help from school or community mental health resources as soon as possible.

## Resiliency Factors

The presence of resiliency factors can lessen the potential of risk factors to lead to suicidal ideation and behaviors. Once a child or adolescent is considered at risk, schools, families, and friends should work to build these factors in and around the youth. These include:

- Family support and cohesion, including good communication.
- Peer support and close social networks.
- School and community connectedness.
- Cultural or religious beliefs that discourage suicide and promote healthy living.
- Adaptive coping and problem-solving skills, including conflict-resolution.
- General life satisfaction, good self-esteem, sense of purpose.
- Easy access to effective medical and mental health resources.
